What Is The Hudson Valley Art Association?

The Hudson Valley Art Association (HVAA) was founded in 1928 by artists of the Hudson Valley Region in the Studio of Jasper Cropsey (1823-1900), one of the most celebrated of the American landscape artists.

For many years the Association functioned as a local art society. Later it became regional – drawing exhibitors from the New England States, New York, New Jersey, Delaware, and Pennsylvania – growing in strength and importance until it is now a national non-profit organization.

No forms of distorted paintings are accepted by the Hudson Valley Art Association at their exhibitions as it is the aim of the Association to preserve and encourage the character, knowledge, craftsmanship and respect for natural form, color and design which distinguish fine painting and sculpture.

HVAA holds an annual exhibition of oils, aqua media, pastels, graphics and sculpture in the Exhibition Galleries of invitational associations. The show is open

to non-members as well as members. Awards totaling approximately \$17,000 are given for meritorious works.

All proceeds from entry fees are applied toward the cost of the exhibition. Any deficit is paid from membership dues. Many long hours are spent in preparation for a show that has gained a wide recognition for both artists and laymen.

To become a member, non-members must have been accepted into three shows, then voted on by the Board of Directors for approval. An invitation is then extended to the artist for membership. If you enjoy the Hudson Valley Art Association Exhibitions, it would be most heartening to learn of your approval. Of course, contributions to the support of the Association, or its Scholarship Fund, are most welcome.



Todd Casey, Casey's work touches on more than simplistic realism. There is a haunting, nearly literary quality to each frame— a feeling that subjects are viewed from behind mottled glass, burnished by enigmatic candlelight, or brushed by the soft, hazy edges of a half-remembered dream. His work is classically styled but progressive in approach. Every painting has a tale to tell, brewed from a deep well of introspective thought.

His paintings have been honored with awards several times in recent years. Most recently, he won first four times at the Portrait Society of America's Members Only Competition and placed first in oil painting from the Allied Artists of America in 2015. His work can be found in collections throughout the United States, and on the East Coast at Rehs Contemporary Gallery, in Midtown New York City, and Simie Maryles Gallery in Provincetown, Massachusetts.

In recent years, Todd has made the transition from painter to author and teacher. He published his first art book The Art of Still Life in 2020 with Monacelli Press. His second book The Oil Painters' Color Handbook came out in 2022. When not painting, writing, or illustrating, Casey teaches classes for the Massachusetts College of Art and The Academy of Art University Online, The Art Students League of New York, and through private online classes and workshops.

Irena Roman, AWS DF is a transparent watercolorist from Scituate, MA. She holds a BFA from Massachusetts College of Art and Design and an MFA from Syracuse University.

Irena achieved Signature Status from the American Watercolor Society in 2012 and has been honored in the AWS International Exhibition with a High Winds Medal (2011), the Ralph Smith Memorial Award (2012), a Silver Medal of Honor (2022), and Dolphin Fellowship status (2022).

She's twice received the Watercolor West Award from The National Watercolor Society, as well as four Gold Medals and two Silver Medals from the New England Watercolor Society. She's holds signature membership with the Transparent Watercolor Society of America, the New England Watercolor Society, the Watercolor Honor Society, and American Women Artists.

In addition to being a painter and illustrator, Irena is a professor at Massachusetts College of Art and Design, Boston, with over twenty-five years of teaching experience. Just a few of the many places she has conducted watercolor workshops are The Norman Rockwell Museum, Stockbridge, MA, Art New England, Bennington, VT, Springfield Art Museum, Springfield, MA, and The Art Complex Museum, Duxbury, MA. In January 2023, Irena was a faculty presenter at Watercolor Live, a Global Virtual Art Conference.

Teaching: Decades of teaching art in a traditional classical manner and specializing in pastel and pastel portrait instruction. Currently conducting an Atelier for the Gifted, teen and adults, a mentoring program for preparation for the life of a professional artist.

I have won many awards in national and international Juried Exhibitions, have conducted and developed teaching, workshop and Atelier Programs. Currently working with the Sage Art Community in Sheridan Wyoming in developing annual art workshops with a variety of chosen Artists to encourage art education and artists in the location.

I put together a chosen group of Artists Exhibition at the Brinton Art Museum in Big Horn Wyoming in 2021, was accepted in the American Women Artists 2019 Steamboat Art Museum Looking West Exhibition, the 34TH IAPS Juried Exhibition the Master's Circle in New Mexico. I won the Silver Medal at the Salmagundi's Member Show 2021, juried into the IAPS 2021 Exhibition in Chicago, won the Daniel Greene Award at the 2021 Hudson Valley Art Association's Juried National Show, an Award for the 2022 Hudson Valley Association Show, and juried into several Juried Exhibitions at Salmagundi 2022.

Fred X. Brownstein Fred X Brownstein attended Tulane University in New Orleans, LA. and then transferred to the San Francisco Art Institute, San Francisco, CA. graduating with a B.F.A. degree in 1970.

In 1971 Fred was accepted as an Artist in Residence at the Karolyi Foundation in Vence, France where he created his first marble sculptures. That year his work was accepted in The

Salon de la Jeune Sculpture in Paris.

In 1974 the painter Stella Ehrich and Fred were married and the following year moved to Italy where the couple lived and worked for sixteen years prior to relocating in Vermont in 1991. During their time in Italy Fred studied figure drawing with the reknown Maestra Nerina Simi in Florence. From 1976 through 1980 Fred apprenticed in the marble sculpture studio of Enzo Pasquini in Querceta learning the traditional Italian techniques from the "smodellatore" Vincenzo Donati and "scultore" Sirio DeRanieri. He also worked with mold maker Sirio Navari to learn the waste mold process of transferring clay models in to plaster casts and because Pietrasanta is home to several bronze foundries began to learn the methods necessary for bronze sculpture and casting his first artworks in bronze.

In 1985 the Town of Stazzema, Italy awarded Fred his first public commission The Monumento ai Caduti (Monument to the Fallen) commemorating the townspeople who died during the two World Wars. Since then he has completed a dozen public sculpture commissions and this summer his marble portrait of Signorina Nerina Simi will be installed in the piazza in front of the Town Hall in Pontestazzemese, Italy along with a companion

portrait of her Father Filadelfo Simi by the Italian sculptor Dino DeRanieri.

Although most of my work is site specific sculpture commissioned by public or private clients, I always take time to make new artwork for exhibition. I firmly believe that good craftsmanship is essential to creating works of art and I practice traditional techniques to realize contemporary figurative sculpture. My work is a personal statement that I consider visual poetry. It is purposely ambiguous and left open to interpretation by the viewer.

Fred is a member of the Salmagundi Club in New York City, a Fellow member of the National Sculpture Society and professional level member of the Stone Carvers Guild. His sculpture is in public and private collections in the U.S., Canada and Italy.
