What is The Hudson Valley Art Association?

The Hudson Valley Art Association (HVAA) was founded in 1928 by artists of the Hudson Valley Region in the Studio of Jasper Cropsey (1823-1900), one of the most celebrated of the American landscape artists.

For many years the Association functioned as a local art society. Later it became regional – drawing exhibitors from the New England States, New York, New Jersey, Delaware, and Pennsylvania – growing in strength and importance until it is now a national non-profit organization.

No forms of distorted paintings are accepted by the Hudson Valley Art Association at their exhibitions as it is the aim of the Association to preserve and encourage the character, knowledge, craftsmanship and respect for natural form, color and design which distinguish fine painting and sculpture. It is this dedication which is symbolized by the sculpture on the cover of this catalogue "The Torchbearers" by Anna Hyatt Huntington, whose works are indeed exemplary of the organization's high ideals.

HVAA holds an annual exhibition of oils, aqua media, pastels, graphics and sculpture in the Exhibition Galleries of invitational associations. The show is open to non-members as well as members. Awards totaling approximately \$10,000 are given for meritorious works.

All proceeds from entry fees are applied toward the cost of the exhibition. Any deficit is paid from membership dues. Many long hours are spent in preparation for a show that has gained wide recognition for both artists and laymen.

Artist members of the Board of Directors select from non-member exhibitors whose work is outstanding, and an invitation is extended to them for membership. If you enjoy the Hudson Valley Art Association Exhibitions, it would be most heartening to learn of your approval. Of course, contributions to the support of the Association, or its Scholarship Fund, are most welcome.

Bruno Lucchesi was born in the Village of Fibbiano Montanino, Lucca, Italy. He studied at the Art Institute of Lucca and was a Professor at Florence University.

Bruno came to America from Italy in 1960 and taught at the National Academy of Design, at The New School in New York City for years, and has held many workshops across the country. Today, his works are in various museum collections: Metropolitan Museum of Art, Whitney Museum of American Art, Museum of the City of New York, Brooklyn Museum, Dallas Museum, Smithsonian Hirshhorn Washington Museum and more. Bruno's art is also collected and made exclusively for Corporations, Institutions, and Universities. He is a member of the National Sculpture Society, National Academy of Design, Artists' Fellowship and other fine art associations. He has

been honored with numerous outstanding awards in the United States and abroad. Bruno is represented by Cavalier Galleries of Greenwich, CT, NYC, and Nantucket, MA.

Edgar Jerins was born in Lincoln, Nebraska in 1958. He graduated from Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts in 1980 with a four-year certificate. That year, he was awarded an Elizabeth Greenshields Foundation Grant. Subsequent grants: The Pollock-Krasner Foundation Grant, New York Foundation for the Arts, Fellowship in Printmaking/Drawing/Artists Books, The Elizabeth Foundation for the Arts Grant, George Sugarman Foundation Grant (twice), and the E.D. Foundation Grant. In 2014 he received the New York Academy of Art's Venture Fund Grant.

He has had solo exhibitions at the Latvian Foreign Art Museum, Riga, Latvia, Museum of Nebraska Art, Payne Gallery at Moravian Collage, and two New York City exhil

His drawing and essay are included in the recent survey of figurative art in the Rizzoli book "The Figure: Painting, Drawing, and Sculpture: Contemporary Perspectives." Reviews include The New York Times, Philadelphia Inquirer, and American Arts Quarterly. A feature article "Uomimi in mezzo ai guair" by Lorena Cerbini appeared in Italy's Arte Magazine. His public collections are Minneapolis Institute of Art, Minneapolis, MN, The Global Center for Latvian Art, Cesis Latvia, Arkansas Art Center, Museum of Nebraska Art, and Moravian College.


He is represented by ACA Galleries in New York City. Jerins is an Adjunct Faculty at the New York Academy of Art.



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
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President's Message
